What should I do if I have symptoms?

- If you have fevers, body aches, swollen glands, a rash, or eye pain and redness, please visit Hu Hu Kam Memorial Hospital Emergency Room or Primary Care walk-in clinics for further evaluation and testing/treatment
- Avoid close contact (including intimate physical contact) with others or animals until you see a healthcare provider
- If you're waiting for test results, follow the same precautions

What should I do if I have monkeypox?

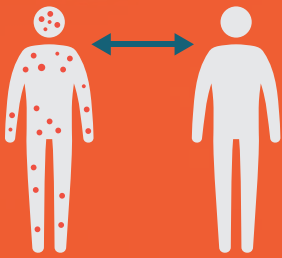
Stay isolated and observe prevention practices until your rash has healed, all scabs have fallen off, and a fresh layer of intact skin has formed.

Until all signs and symptoms of monkeypox illness have fully resolved:

- Wear a well-fitting mask
- Cover rash
- Do not share items that have been worn or handled with other people or animals
- Launder or disinfect items that have been worn or handled and surfaces that have been touched by a lesion
- Avoid close physical contact, including sexual and/or close intimate contact, with other people
- Avoid sharing utensils or cups. Items should be cleaned and disinfected before use by others
- Avoid crowds and congregate settings
- Wash hands often with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer, especially after direct contact with the rash
- Only go out to see a healthcare provider or for an emergency. Please avoid public transportation



How can monkeypox be prevented?



Avoid close, skin-to-skin contact with people who have a rash that looks like monkeypox



Avoid contact with objects and materials that a person with monkeypox has used



Wash your hands often with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer, especially before eating or touching your face and after you use the bathroom



By the Numbers

As of November 4th, **78,229** confirmed or probable monkeypox cases have been identified in 109 locations, including **28,657** in the U.S. and **538** in Arizona.

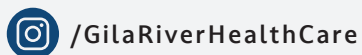
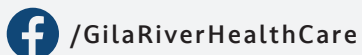
U.S. Cases

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Monkeypox: Vaccine and Treatments

- Who can get the vaccine?
- Can monkeypox be treated?

Who can get the vaccine?

Vaccination is for people who have been exposed to monkeypox and people who may be more likely to get monkeypox, including:

- People who have been identified by public health officials as a contact of someone with monkeypox
- People who know one of their sexual partners in the past two weeks has been diagnosed with monkeypox
- People who had multiple sexual partners in the past two weeks in an area with known monkeypox



Can monkeypox be treated?

- Most patients have mild illness and recover on their own without any treatment
- But because the viruses that cause monkeypox and smallpox are similar, antiviral drugs developed to protect against smallpox may be used to treat monkeypox effectively
- The antiviral drug tecovirimat (TPOXX) has been authorized by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to treat severe infections of monkeypox and can be ordered through GRHC
